What is guided reading? In simple language, it means small-group reading instruction that allows teachers to meet students where they are and lead them forward with intention and precision. "Reading should not be presented to children as a chore or duty.

Guided reading focuses on reading comprehension and, except with the youngest readers, that is best practiced through silent reading. This guided/communal reading can take many forms.

### What do you think of Guided Reading for secondary school ...

Guided reading helps students develop greater control over the reading process through the development of reading strategies which assist decoding and construct meaning. The teacher guides or 'scaffolds' their students as they read, talk and think their way through a text (Department of Education, 1997).
